





TRATEGIC public assets in Sabah should not face any power or water supply shortages.

Health Minister bent on getting 'generational end game' law passed

KUALA LUMPUR: Enforcing the ban on smoking and possession of tobacco products among those born after 2005 will be a challenge but the Health Minister says he is determined to get the law passed in Parliament

Khairy Jamaluddin said the ministry was committed to ensuring that the proposed "Generational

end game" plan in Malaysia was achieved. "Let's get the law passed in Parliament this July, Generational end game to smoking.

"Those born after 2005 will not be able to buy smoking products, ever. "Yes, enforcement will be an

issue and we will work hard on this. But let's shut the door once and for all for our youth," he said on Twitter and Instagram.

The proposed Tobacco and

Smoking Control Act aims to prohibit the sale of tobacco products to those born after 2005.

This includes vape products.

If the law is passed, a person who turns 18 in 2023 will not be able to

legally buy tobacco products.

Khairy first highlighted Malaysia's plan during the 150th session of the World Health Organisation's executive board meeting in Geneva recently.

The decision to introduce the

smoking ban is to reduce the number of new smokers in the country, as tobacco has been identified as the cause of many cancer deaths in Malaysia.

cancer caused by smoking.

Last month, Khairy said the
Tobacco and Smoking Control Bill
was being finalised and that it

10,619 recoveries recorded on Tuesday

KUALA LUMPUR: A total of 10,619 Covid-19 recovery cases were recorded in the country on Tuesday, bringing the cumulative number of recoveries to 4,274,746, says the Health director-general.

Tan Sri Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said the number of new cases had dropped to 6,069 compared with 7,140 recorded the previous day,

bringing the cumulative figure for positive Covid-19 cases thus far to 4,402,234.

"Of the 6,069 new cases reported "Of the 6,069 new cases reported yesterday, 5,959 were local transmissions involving 96.4% Malaysians and 3.6% foreigners, while 110 were imported cases comprising 66.4% Malaysians and 33.6% foreigners," he said in a statement

Bernama reported yesterday.

Dr Noor Hisham said a total of 241 Covid-19 cases were admitted to 241 Covid-19 cases were admitted to hospitals comprising 97 cases (40.2%) in Categories Three, Four and Five, while 144 cases (59.8%) were in Categories One and Two.

He said no state recorded over 50% of bed occupancy at the Intensive Care Unit (ICU), and

Covid-19 patients in need of a venti-lator dropped to 64 with the per-centage of ventilators use being 8%.

Five new clusters were identified, bringing the total number of active clusters to 109, while the Covid-19 infectivity rate or Rt value recorded nationwide was 0.86 with Negri Sembilan recording the highest Rt value of 0.90, he said.

487,728 children fully vaxxed **PICKids**

KUALA LUMPUR: A total of 487,728 children aged five to 11 or 13.7% of the child population in the country have been fully vaccinated under the Covid-19 National Immunisation Pro-gramme for Children (PICKids)

as of Tuesday.

According to the CovidNow website, a total of 1,425,865 children in the same age group or 40.1% have received at least one

dose of the vaccine.

For adolescents aged between 12 and 17, a total of 2,877,332 individuals or 92.5% of the group have completed the vaccination.

For this group, a total of 2,978,531 or 95.8% have received at least one dose of the Covid-19

vaccine.

As for the adult population, a total of 15,985,545 individuals or 67.9% have received the booster dose, 22,961,980 or 97.6% have completed both doses.

It was also reported that 23,238,874 or 98.8% have received at least one dose of the vaccine.

According to the website, almost 70 million doses of the vaccine has been administered in the country.

On Tuesday, a total of 47,612 doses of the vaccine were administered, with 35,398 as second doses, 4,635 booster doses and 7,579 as first doses, bringing the cumulative number of vaccine doses dispensed under the National Covid-19 Immunisation

Programme (PICK) to 69,742,922.
The immunisation programme was rolled out last year.

Double whammy at sister hospitals

Power outage at QEH1, burst pipe at QEH2 being rectified, says Health Dept

KOTA KINABALU: It was twin trouble here with a major hospital struggling with power outage while its namesake counterpart was hav-

ing to deal with a burst water pipe.

Problems began at 11.30pm on Tuesday at Queen Elizabeth Hospital 1 (QEH1) with staff having to depend on their mobile phone torchights to get around. This following a power outage caused by an internal electrical fault.

Social media pictures uploaded showed scenes of staff using their built-in torch lights as firemen came

to help people who were stuck in the elevators.

As for the Queen Elizabeth Hospital 2 (QEH2), a video shared on social media yesterday showed medical staff cleaning out water that was rabbing from social media. that was gushing from a ceiling of a



basement car park.
This was due to a burst water pipe at the car park yesterday morning.

The situation was under control although the hospital stopped all elective surgeries for the day pending completion of repairs on the

rater pipe.

Over at QEH1, its operating thea-

tres remained temporarily closed for the second day yesterday as work continued to fix the electrical for the second day

According to officials, emergency cases including surgeries have been diverted to the QEH2 and the Women and Children Hospital in Likas here temporarily as technicians work to resolve the power problem.

They have also postponed 28 elective surgeries for the two days at QEH1 as the current power was insufficient to support the required

insufficient to support the required air-conditioning temperatures for the operating theatres.

Following Tuesday's power outage, the hospital operated on its generators but by 3.30pm, the generators also failed, triggering power failure across the hospital.

Sabah Electricity Sdn Bhd (SESB)

sent in two of its mobile generator units to restore power by 7.10pm but faults within the internal electrical

faults within the internal electrical cables of the hospital were suspected of triggering the power outage.

Sabah Health Department director Datuk Dr Rose Nani Mudin said yesterday that repair works on the electrical cables were ongoing but a cable and say when they would be could not say when they would be completed.

In a statement, she said the hospital was running on its two generators that broke down before SESB sent in

their mobile generator units.

Dr Rose said power was fully Trestored in all its units including the intensive care unit by 8pm on Tuesday though emergency cases needing critical services were transferred to QEH2.

She said that there was minimal

disruption to services and assured the public measures were being taken to help restore the power sup

As for the burst pipe at QEH2 which flooded the basement, she said that efforts are under way to speed up repairs.

She said that the situation was

under control and that the water in the basement had been cleared.

She said that the QEH2 manage

ment together with the mainte-nance contractors were putting in place a new pipeline to bypass the burst pipe.

SESB: Power outage caused by hospital's own cable

KOTA KINABALU: The power dis-ruption at Queen Elizabeth Hospital 1 (QEH1) stemmed from the hospital's own internal system, says Sabah Electricity Sdn Bhd

Its chief executive officer, Mohd Yaakob Jaafar, said an inspection of SESB power cables to QEH1 found that they were in good condition and had not suffered any

damage.
"SESB's technical team tested and found that SESB's installation is in good condition and the cause of the supply disruption is in the hospital's

internal system," he said in a statement yesterday.

He said further checks found that

the cause of the supply disruption in the hospital building was due to damage to the underground cable belonging to QEH1.

"SESB is ready to assist the hospi-

tal to test and detect the location of the cable damage if needed," he said, adding that two mobile generator sets had been sent at 5pm on Tuesday to provide temporary power to the hospital.

A power outage occurred at the QEH1 twin tower building at about

11.20am on Tuesday and the situation worsened when two of the in-house generators broke down at

SESB brought in the mobile generators to QEH1 by 5.47pm on Tuesday and temporary power supply was restored by 7.10pm.

Tawau Hospital upgrade to be done by year end

TAWAU: The upgrading of Tawau Hospital will be completed by the end of this year, said Deputy Works Minister Datuk Arthur Joseph Kurup.

He said as of March 31, the project's progress had reached 70%, and to ensure that the remaining work could be completed on time, the contractor had to achieve a set progress target of about 4% every month.

"The target is based on discussions with the contractor and monitoring measures taken by the Public Works Department to ensure that work progresses according to the set schedule.

"The department closely monitors mitigation plans and the progress of the contractor's work. The contractor's performance will be evaluated according to a weekly work progress report," he told reporters after inspecting the project vesterday.

Arthur said the department would not hesitate to issue a warning to the contractor if there are delays.

"The hospital upgrading project started in 2017 and was scheduled to be completed in 2020 at a cost of about RM210 million, but the project was delayed due to movement control orders (MCO) as well as land-structure

"So the Public Works Department, allowed an extension of time to the contractor.

"The MCO had led to a chain of problems such as a lack of local and foreign workers as well as difficulties in obtaining building materials due to the closure of factories," he said, adding that currently, the contractor employed 80% local workers, reducing reliance on foreign labour.

Arthur said when the project is completed, Tawau Hospital will be the largest one in the East Coast of Sabah and a referral hospital for surrounding districts.

He said the new hospital will accommodate an additional 154 beds, bringing the total number to 555, while other facilities include six operating rooms, four endoscopy suites, 30 haemodialysis units as well as a helipad, the first for a hospital in Sabah. - Bernama

A total of 47,612 doses were administered on Tuesday, with 35,398 as second doses, 4,635 as booster doses and 7,579 as first doses, bringing the cumulative number of doses dispensed under the immunisation programme to 69,742,922.

According to the Health Ministry's GitHub portal, 12 deaths due to Covid-19 were reported, with Perak recording the highest number at five cases, followed by Johor with three cases. Kedah, Malacca, Pahang and Putrajaya recorded one case each. – Bernama

New cases showing downward trend

KUALA LUMPUR: A total of 10,619 Covid-19 recovered cases were recorded on Tuesday, bringing the cumulative number of recoveries to 4,274,746.

Health Director-General Tan Sri Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah

Health Director-General and ST Dr Noor Hisham Abdullah said the number of new daily cases had dropped to 6,069 compared with 7,140 recorded the previous day, bringing the cumulative number of cases thus far to 4,402,234.

"Of the new cases, 5,959 were local transmission involving 96.4% locals and 3.6% foreigners, while 110 were imported cases comprising 66.4% locals and 33.6% foreigners," he said in a statement yesterday.

Noor Hisham said a total of 241 Covid-19 patients were

241 Covid-19 patients were admitted to hospitals comprising 97 cases (40.2%) in comprising 97 cases (40.2%) in categories three, four and five, while 144 cases (59.8%) in categories one and two.

He added no state recorded over 50% of bed occupancy at the intensive care unit.

over 50% of bed occupancy at the intensive care unit. Five new clusters were identified bringing the total number of active clusters to 109, while the infectivity rate or Rt value recorded nationwide was 0.86 with Negri Sembilan recording the highest Rt value of 0.90, he said. – Bernama

Khairy renews call for youth smoking ban

KUALA LUMPUR: Health Minister Khairy Jamaluddin has repeated a call for the bill on youth smoking ban to be passed when it is tabled in Dewan Rakyat in July.

Khairy in a tweet yesterday said a new law would be a generational end game to smoking. "Those born after 2005 will not be

able to buy smoking products. Yes, enforcement will be an issue and we will work hard on this, he said.

His posting came with a retweet of a post by a local news organisation, which reported that a survey conducted by a non-governmental organisation for tobacco control showed that the

policy was supported by 95% of young respondents aged 24 and below and 89% of smokers and

vapers.

In March, Khairy said a new law to ban smoking activities and possession of any smoking products, including electronic cigarettes for those born after 2005, will be tabled

in Dewan Rakyat in July.

On Feb 17, Khairy announced the introduction of the law, aimed at reducing the exposure of future generations to cigarettes and smoking products, as their consumption is a major factor in cancer incidences and accounts for 22% of cancer deaths. – Bernama
